



The Gibsonville Garden Railway

Back on 11 April 2010, Rick Knight, Jim Rager, Stephen Wood and myself ventured up the small town of Gibsonville, North Carolina. Gibsonville, known as the "City of Roses", is located in the Piedmont Triad

area of North Carolina, between Greensboro and Burlington. With an estimated population of 5,775, Gibsonville offers a small town atmosphere to live, work, and play while providing quick access larger to neighboring cities.

One of the really cool aspects of visiting Gibsonville is the parks. One park which is located

in the center of town has a very unique feature, which is a Garden Railroad. The railroad is the brain child of a very avid model railroader by the name of Bobby Summers.

In July of 1997, more than 12 years ago, Bobby decided that he would like to give something back to the town. So he approached the town with an idea to build a Garden Railway. He wrote up the proposal and submitted his ideas to the City of Gibsonville and they loved the idea.

The town allowed Bobby to build the Gibsonville


Garden Railway. The city would provide the land and power and Bobby provided just about everything else. The layout is approximately 80' x 85' and is located right in the center of town. It has approximately 1,500' of track and can run 5 different trains at the same time on different tracks.

The few of us who went to meet with Bobby on a wonderful day in April, had just a wonderful time of conversation and being able to sit down, slow down and enjoy watching the trains go around the park. Oh, I think I forgot to mention that the real mainline is less that 100' a way from this layout.

Bobby runs this layout on Sunday afternoons starting about 1PM until about 5PM weather permitting. Oh, don't look for Bobby on those stifling hot Carolina summer days because he will not be there. Another neat little feature of the Gibsonville Railway is that it can run 80 car coal trains from time to time. They take 6 locomotives and I am told are sight to see.

BOY SCOUT RAILROADING MERIT BADGE Rick Knight

On Saturday, May 8th, the McGuire Nuclear Station and the Energy Explorium were host to more than 525 Boy Scouts from Councils stretching from Albemarle to Shelby and Sparta to Rock Hill. Most of the Scouts arrived early Friday evening and camped overnight on the lawns near the Explorium. Bright and early on Saturday morning they assembled at the flag pole and divided out to follow their Merit Badge counselors. Steve August and I rounded up our Scouts and headed off to our respective layouts – Steve had seven (7) Scouts and I had ten (10).

At my session, the Scouts and I worked our way through the basic requirements – identifying ten different kinds of railroad cars, talking about how braking systems work, discussing different jobs available on railroads, etc. Heavy on the agenda were safety issues and Operation Lifesaver. By the time we were about talked out, lunch arrived.

Then we launched into a formal Operating Session – what better way to really show the Scouts how a real railroad does business? Jim Rager and Roy Becker, two of my Monday Night Irregulars, helped to guide the Scouts. I had a matrix assembled with three (3) half-hour sessions. Each session had job assignments: one Dispatcher; five Yard operators; two Conductor and Engineer teams. On the half hour the jobs rotated, keeping the flow interesting and informative.

By 3:00 pm the merit badge cards had been signed and the Scouts were on their way back to the Explorium to meet up with the rest of their Troops.
