

The RailRun weekend, from my perspective was a great success! We got to visit layouts that we don't normally get to see, meet fellow modelers, and had fun! Many of us have seen Rick Knight's KB&D and Jack Parker's P&W, but not as many have seen Neal Anderson's KK&L or David Ward's DB&W, both of which are very large and realistic, and still under construction.

A new layout this year was Chuck Batherson's Blue Ridge & White Mountain Railroad, which runs from coastal Maine through northern New Hampshire to St. Albans, Vermont. This HO layout is actually in Greensboro, so we did need an hour and a half to get there. It was the first BR&WM operating session, and although still under construction, the bench and trackwork is well done. Communications between dispatcher, engineers, and yardmasters is via hand-held radios, necessary because this section of northern New England takes up most of the basement!

Busy Times at Brookford By Gil Brauch Brookford Train Town Project Manager Carolina Southern Division, MER And Operation Lifesaver Presenter #7612

Each year the Newton Community Schools offers a SummerKids program for children in grades K-8 in the Catawba County school system. This year the Program Coordinator contacted our Brookford Project Manager, Gil Brauch, to arrange for children in nine of the schools in the program to visit Wade's Train Town during the summer. Since Gil is also an Operation Lifesaver Presenter, he could not pass up the opportunity to turn these field trips into a rail safety learning experience for the children involved. Attendance at the seven sessions we hosted ranged from 25 to 70, with two of the sessions involving children from two schools. The total attendance was 294.

The children were simply awed by the scope of the layout. "WOW!!" and "AWESOME!!" were frequent phrases heard as they entered the room. "Look, a Burger King... and a Pizza Hut!!" "Look at the people in the swimming pool." "Dinosaur bones!!" Several of the children didn't want to leave when it was time to let another group have their turn at admiring the landscape.

You might expect that all this enthusiasm would lead to accidents, particularly with trains running so close to the edge of the layout. However, the children were very well behaved and responded well to the reminders of their teachers to "Look with our eves, not with our hands."

Gil set up a small theater in the Brookford Community Center's lunchroom and after all the children had the opportunity to look at the layout, he 'treated' them to a short Operation Lifesaver class on safety around trains and tracks. The Newton Community Schools coordinator, Kim Cline, reported that the children universally reported that they had a good time and really liked the layout. Hopefully, some will come back with their parents during one of our monthly open houses.

Just a reminder to our members that we are still holding regular restoration working sessions on the second and fourth Thursday evenings (6:30 - ???). Our open houses are on the second Saturday of each month (10 am - 4 pm). We are about three fourths of the way done with our first pass at restoration and there's always something for a volunteer to do - no matter what your skill level or particular area of modeling interest. All are welcome and encouraged to join in.

Although I signed up a little late, I was able to schedule myself into layouts for all six time slots. Two were ones where I had operated before or at least run a train, but the other four were completely new. Three were N-scale which I had never tried operating before. I was able to pair morning and afternoon sessions that were relatively close to each other or at least in the same general direction from my home in South Charlotte so I wouldn't have far to go between sessions. Unfortunately, the morning sessions were all the farthest away which meant an early start in the morning to get there by 8:30 or so to get some sense of the railroad before operations began.

Besides meeting some great people who share my hobby, the weekend provided an opportunity to expand my range of experience with this aspect of model railroading. The N-scale layouts were much easier to operate than I had anticipated. So much so that by Monday, I had trouble remembering which layouts were which scale there was so little difference from HO which has been my experience to date. There were three different waybill/car routing methods and every layout had a little different variation on the basic method. Several layouts had full or partial automatic detection and signalling systems. Every had а different system for one dispatching. Along the way I filled the

jobs of Dispatcher (1), Yardmaster(2), and Engineer for both local(6) and through (2) freights. The layouts I worked on all used DCC, but there were two different systems.

The South Carolina Railroad Museum is proud to offer you a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity... Be an Engineer !

The *Engineer Experience* will be a unique opportunity to learn about and operate a full-size steam locomotive.

Participants will be instructed – on a one-on-one basis – in the basic, safe operation of a steam locomotive and will put those skills to use by operating the 126 Steam Engine under the supervision of the South Carolina Railroad Museum.

The dates are **October 8 and October 29**. Registration must be in advance, and a limited number of spaces are available. All participants must become members of the South Carolina Railroad Museum.

Participation is limited to 18 persons per day, with each hands-on operation lasting approximately 20 minutes with an operating distance of two miles. Scheduling is on a firstcome, first-served basis.

Cost to participate is \$100.00 (\$75 registration fee, plus a minimum \$25 individual SCRM membership.)

Participants must be 21 years of age, in good health, physically able to enter and exit the locomotive cab, and willing to follow the instructions of the supervising steam locomotive engineer and/or fireman.

Proper clothing, shoes, and eye and head protection must be worn while operating the steam locomotive and while on the grounds of the South Carolina Railroad Museum. It will be a fun day – but remember – there will be smoke, cinders and soot!
