That set expanded from a circle on a board to an oval on a larger board. This expanded set had a passing siding on one side and sidings for spotting cars on the other. I didn't know it then but that was basic operating. Scenery and buildings followed and that lasted a few years before going into storage. A move, marriage, and big snow storm later, the set came out of storage again to take me back and rekindle my interest into model trains. I awoke one morning after it had been snowing all night. Total for that storm was 13.5". Snowed in and looking for something to do with my time, I found an old box packed away. Upon opening it, my childhood memories came back. Inside were all my trains from years past. Nothing fancy, just some Tyco and Model Power Locomotives and freight cars, but that was enough to get me started again. Then came the 4 X 8 layout with Athearn Blue Box equipment. After the move to my current home in 1994, a new layout was started. An 18" around the wall shelf layout. Some of you may remember this as it was on the Layout Tour during Junction 98

DIVISION AND REGIONAL NEWS

There will not be a Division Meeting during December. CSD's November meeting was held on Saturday, November 10th at Wade's Train Town in Brookford along with our Annual Swap Meet. Assistant Superintendent Jack Monette, MMR, opened the meeting shortly after 10:00am with the announcement that Superintendent Alan Hardee was ill with kidney stones. Shortly after the meeting, I talked with Alan, who was through the crisis and recovering.

Convention Chairman Neal Anderson opened discussions with progress points regarding CSD hosting of the 2020 MER Convention:

- 1. Neal is focusing on narrowing down location for the convention. Most feedback indicates desire to avoid being in the inner city of Charlotte. Possible areas are Concord Mills, Statesville and Mooresville.
- 2. Preliminary cost inquiries show room costs to be in the low \$80 range, opening the possibility that even adding cost of a banquet dinner could keep room costs at or near \$100.
- 3. Nearby attractions such as the Transportation Museum at Spencer, NASCAR Hall of Fame and Lionel Headquarters may be additional factors in favor of a particular location. For visitors flying into the area, the Carolinas Aviation Museum adjacent to the Charlotte airport are an obvious additional attraction.
- 4. The date is to be the third weekend in October of 2020 (Thursday 10/15/20 through Sunday 10/18/20). This is an open weekend without other competing major events in the Charlotte area.
- 5. Part of negotiations (to be conducted by MER officials) will be to set target number of visitors for rooms and meals. Feedback from the 2018 MER Convention in Rockville show that they missed their target of 150 rooms (only booked 122). This shortfall was offset some by additional meal sales. As of the meeting, the Potomac Division had still not determined if they had broken even on the convention or made a small profit.
- 6. Neal was optimistic that we could show a profit for the Division based on Raleigh's Tracks to Triangle MER Convention hosting in 2016, when they turned a comfortable profit.
- 7. Clerk Ed Gumphrey added comments repeating Layout Tour Chairman Tim Rumph's call for volunteers for layout tours. It doesn't need to be finished, nor does it need to be "completed." Jack Parker, MMR, noted that he was assisting Tim in recruiting layout tours, and that members could contact him as well.

Gil Brauch, MMR, made announcements about two topics:

1. Volunteers are needed to continue the Division's project of open house at Wade's Train Town in Brookford. Gil emphasized that with over 120 members in CSD, we could keep the event alive with members only needing to volunteer one weekend per year.

- a. Two people are needed to host the event on the second Saturday of each month.
- b. Gil cannot continue to staff the event by himself. If volunteers are not forthcoming, CSD will have to abandon the effort.
 One hopeful note Ed Smith spent the afternoon with Gil learning how to operate the layout so he can assist in future open house events.

c. Decision regarding future of this event will be based on discussions during the annual meeting in January.

2. RMU registration is open. See the links on page one of this edition, or at the CSD website.

Larry Paffrath gave a brief description of the T-Track N scale modules on display for the meeting. Larry and other Carolina N Scalers pointed out the following differences between T-Track and N-Track modules:

- 1. T-Track modules have two mainlines as compared to N-Track's three.
- Modules are smaller and lighter that N-Track.
- There is freedom of track arrangements within the module as long as there is connection to uniformly placed main line trackage.

- 4. The ability to more easily transport modules (even in compact cars) is a significant benefit.
- 5. The two end modules on display were completed with scenery.

Editor's note: I attempted in vain to get some closeup photos of the T-Track end modules. Between backlighting from one end and low light from the other, none of my pictures are worthy of publication.

FELLOWSHIP

I became a member of the NMRA in the early 1990's. At the time, I was living in Akron, Ohio near the old Erie R.R. mainline. I was a member of the Erie Lackawanna Historical Society and was looking for something to blend the historical side and the modeling side of the hobby. The ELHS provided me the archival nuts and bolts of the Erie R.R. and the NMRA provided information on building a model railroad. Also, the

NMRA membership provided me access to the National Conventions. Over the next decade, I spent my railroad time collecting volumes of Erie R.R. information (fortunately, the ELHS archives were located in my city), procuring a large quantity of HO equipment, and attending NMRA national conventions. All these things were beneficial, but something was lacking. There just didn't seem to be any personal interaction. I was a member of the Mid-Central region, but my division seemed to be dormant. I never had any personal contact with anyone in the 14 years I was a member. The ELHS was a little better, with the availability of the archives and correspondence through the mail. But with all types of railroad information around me, the lack of camaraderie only fortified my lone wolf modeling.

Change comes slowly. It began in 2006 with retirement, relocation to North Carolina, and building a new home. I now had the time and space to build my railroad. I had the railroad, the Erie, but needed area and era. The NMRA national convention in 2006 was in Philadelphia, PA sponsored by the MER, my new region. This convention not only solidified my modeling goals, but also gave me insight into what I had been missing for 15 years back in Ohio.

At the convention, I picked a layout tour to New Jersey that had Harold Werthwein's Erie R.R. Delaware division on it. As a bonus, Tony Koester's Allegheny Midland was also listed. Harold and I both belong to the ELHS and had corresponded several times on our interests in the Erie R.R. I was really anticipating our meeting, but had no idea how it would change my modeling aspirations. So on my 55th birthday I was off to New Jersey to visit Harold. To say this layout is an inspiration is understating the facts. The layout is large (26 x 80) and visually represents almost all 90 miles of the Erie R.R. Delaware Division, from Port Jervis, NY to Binghamton, NY along the Delaware River. Here I was, a 55 year-old, transported back to a kid at Christmas. What made it more special were Harold and his operating crew. They answered all my questions, not in a patronizing fashion, but with eagerness and interest. Here's where I realized what I was missing in the hobby, fellowship. In my 15 years of involvement, this was my first personal interaction in my hobby.

Upon returning home, with my modeling endorphins raging, I spent the next 10 years planning and building the Erie Delaware Division and attending the yearly national conventions. But, because I lived in an NMRA dead zone, no division affiliation, I regressed back into a lone wolf modeler. I still enjoyed the hobby immensely, but you can only talk to your dog for so long.

This changed around 2017. Our division incorporated several of these dead areas into their jurisdiction, one being mine. With that came an invitation from Superintendent Alan Hardee


to attend division functions. I took advantage of the invitation. I'm trying to get more involved in our division. Nudging from Ed Gumphrey has me writing a monthly column in *The Brass Pounder*. I hope they don't bore the readers too much. Meeting Gil Brauch, MMR, has allowed me to get involved in Wade's Train Town. Gil's tireless dedication for over a decade has brought this layout back from near extinction to being the best kept secret jewel in our hobby. He would like more help. It would be a shame for this layout to go dormant again.

And I've been inspired to get involved in the A.P. program by the offers of support and assistance from people like Dave Chance, Neal Anderson ,Gil Brauch, and many of our other division MMR's. What a gift to our division to have people like this.

Also, there's our commitment to the MER convention in 2020. There will be plenty to do, so I don't know what that will bring.

What I'm trying to say is, if you're interested, please get involved. A little or a lot, it doesn't take much. Attend a monthly meeting or, like me, step out of your comfort zone and do things you never thought you would do. What you'll find is a rewarding experience and a core group of remarkable, talented, and friendly people. Fellowship – that was my missing piece. Maybe it's yours. In looking back, I think I was part of my problem. Because I did not make a good effort to get involved, I lost over 20 years of camaraderie and friendship. Don't you do the same.

By the way, that division in Ohio that I thought was dormant, recently hosted the 2014 National Convention, a homecoming of sorts. A great convention week. I didn't know these people existed. I should have been more pro-active. Get involved, I think you'll enjoy yourself.

MER 2018 CONVENTION LAYOUT TOUR #2



Bill Demas's Westmoreland Railroad

Although this is my second article about the layout tours I took during the MER 2018 Convention, Bill Demas's Westmoreland Railroad was actually the first of my three tours. Located in the basement of his Rockville home, the layout is roughly 16' x 24' overall. From his own description, the Westmoreland is a freelanced Class 1 bridge road, set during the transition era from steam to first generation diesels. The setting is eastern areas of Pennsylvania anthracite coal country. Inspiration is provided by PRR and P&W. The layout is usually operated in a point-to-point fashion, but a loop at one end provides flexibility for an out-and-back scheme as well. Industries abound, so there is plenty of local freight operation and lots of switching opportunities. Control is by Digitrax DCC. One innovation that impressed me was the use of a mirror on the ceiling that allows operators to view the hidden staging yards.

Bill enjoys the fellowship of fellow Potomac Division members for round-robin style operating sessions. He uses switch lists during his operating sessions and integrates them into a timetable and train-order structure. Both through and local freight trains have to be ready to clear the main when the timetable demands for the occasional passenger trains. There were five other visitors during the time I was there, so I didn't get to spend much time talking with Bill, but did enjoy looking at his well-executed railroad and watching the flawless operation of his trains. As usual, I'll let some photos tell the rest of the story.


