Superintendent's Message

Where do I start? There's so much track to cover!

I hope you'll join us on Saturday, March 17th in Brookford. Wade's Train Town is coming along very well. We're attacking it block by block, cleaning the buildings on the exteriors (with rubbing alcohol and Qtips), addressing any repair needs, painting the insides (so the illumination will not 'bleed' through the walls), re-doing the landscaping. With 310 structures, there's still a LOT to do. The citizens of Train Town (some 3100 of them) have to be repositioned. Their vehicles need to be cleaned. There are wires to solder. None of the track has been ballasted. But - the carnival has been refurbished and it's operating again. The light rail came in on budget and it's operating. The main lines are operational (but the sidings need to be wired and such).

We'll be at the layout from 9:00 am until late afternoon – come whenever you can and stay as long as you can. The Town of Brookford will celebrate its Centennial on April 21st and we'd like the layout to be in fine shape. For Saturday, I'll be making a large batch of chili – or you can eat at the Bo Peep diner is across the street.

The easiest way to get there is to take Highway 321 North to Highway 127. At the end of the ramp, turn RIGHT and about a

third of a mile later, turn RIGHT onto South Center Street. On the way up the hill, you'll see the Bo Peep on the right and the Town Building on the left (the old school). If you're planning to come, please let me know at 704-996-6486.

And be ready to drive back to Hickory two weeks later. The TRAIN SHOW at the Metro Center on March 31st is going to be a great event. Details, as always, are on the website – just click on the TIMETABLE.

Operating Sessions on the Piedmont & Western Railroad – Jack Parker's empire – have expanded from the traditional first Saturday night of the month to include the Friday immediately before it. Again, details are available on the website (http://www.pandw.org/). This is a Great Model Railroad right in our back yard and it's not a static display. It works! And the Operating Sessions are a hoot of a time!

We've been out and about almost every month, touring layouts and 1:1 sites. I hope you'll join us in the months to come. As you might have guessed, I delight in these events. I come away from every one of them with an idea or two. Maybe it's something I noticed on a layout that I need to apply to my own. Maybe it's a detail or two that I noticed alongside the 'real' tracks. And maybe it's just something that came up in a conversation. Some how, some way I learned something new. And that's a good thing. The camaraderie is frosting on the cake. It's a great time when

you can get together with folks that share a common interest.

Clerk's Meeting Notes

We've had two meetings so far this year. Here are my observations about the meetings for those who were not able to attend, or who were there, but missed somethings I saw or heard, or who just plain forgot what happened:

<u>January 20, 2007 Annual Business</u> <u>Meeting and Layout Tour:</u>

Meeting was held at the Cherryville Depot Museum, Cherryville, NC. Before the formal meeting, we viewed the layouts the club has built at the Depot in multiple scales. Seventeen Division members were present along with two NMRA members from outside the division and three guests. Full minutes of the meeting are available on the Division web site.

Gil Brauch asked members to contribute items for the web site including photos of Division Activities, Where In CSD photos, and favorite prototype logos. He would also like any photos of personal layouts or links to websites with photos and other materials. Email them to him (csdweb@charter.net)

Jack Monette was elected for Director-2009.

Plans were made to have a judged model contest later this year, probably at the September Meeting.

Fred Miller reported on the Region Board meeting. First, they plan to begin a program to provide grants to Divisions to help fund projects like Train Town. Second, there are openings for Region Director. Nominations should be sent to J. J. Johnson. Third, the Region is offering to fund Rail Pass memberships for new

members. This is an NMRA program that provides 6 months membership to new members (without voting or officer eligibility) for \$9.95. The Division should contact the Region to arrange this (free) membership for anyone who is interested in joining the NMRA. The Rail Pass is available only to completely new members, not former members rejoining.

The afternoon was filled by a group tour of four great home layouts in the area. Our thanks to the tour hosts, Barry Fichter, Dick Schafer, Bill Robinson, and Bob Fanter (home layout and Cherryville Depot club) for welcoming us into their homes and having some great modeling on display.

February 22nd meeting:

The meeting began with a visit to the Valdese museum and the Piedmont and Western club layout located at the Museum. The Museum and layout are in the Old Rock School House in the downtown area of Valdese, NC. It houses both a large HO scale layout and prototype historical displays.

The layout is fully scenicked with rugged mountains, a large city, and several small towns and industries. It generally models the Southern S-line through Western North Carolina. Division members were kept busy finding the many small detailed scenes everywhere on the layout. There were several highly detailed and weathered structures.

Leaving the P&W, we visited the Hudson Depot Museum which is housed in the original railroad depot that has been moved to a small park behind the town hall. It has local railroad and historic materials and a 12" = 1' scale wooden caboose.

We thank our hosts from the P&W club, Ken Humphreys and Alan Coleman, and Lucy Wagner from the Hudson Depot Museum for their hospitality and very interesting and informative tours.

There is someone at just about every meeting ready to talk to me about something they are doing, have done, or plan to do; so get it down on paper or in your computer and send it in. We also want to hear from anyone else who would be willing and interested to work with other members to develop articles. Publishing in the Brass Pounder may earn points toward the Author AP. The Editors' own selection of subjects and writing styles will provide limited variety. Different viewpoints and approaches will make this publication more interesting and useful for the membership.
